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Youth Report

The 2017-2018 FSPA Student Poetry Contest is underway! Letters and rules went out to all Florida middle and high school language arts supervisors as well as interested teachers and individuals. E-mails were also sent to all Florida school superintendents. The contest will be judged by Zachary Kluckman of New Mexico and Barbara Green Powell of Texas.

Beginning last year, first-place winners in each grade level received the Lee Bennett Hopkins Poetry Award for Young People, and each place winner received a monetary award as well, thanks to the generosity of Mr. Hopkins, a renowned anthologist of youth poetry and an honorary FSPA chancellor. These prizes will continue to be awarded in the 2017-2018 contest.

The contest deadline is **December 1, 2017**, and as always, we encourage Chapters and Members-at-Large to publicize the contest in your local areas. Announcements in local newspapers, church newsletters, library programs, etc. could help us spread the news. Contest rules are posted on the FSPA website and can be printed for distribution. We still appreciate donations, even though our award costs have been covered, because postage and other expenses tend to go up as entries increase. Promoting poetry among our young is such an important goal.

The 2016-2017 Student Contest will wrap up with the mailing of *Cadence*, our annual anthology, in which the winning poems are printed. The anthologies are mailed to all our winners, their teachers, and the judges of the contest.

Members and chapters: Please send me reports of any poetry activities you are doing with young people (workshops, open mic readings, competitions, etc.), since NFSPS regularly requests that information.

Music and poetry filled the Hilton Orlando—Altamonte Springs, October 13th through the 15th at "Voices Carry," the FSPA 2017 Convention. Keynoted by Florida State Poet Laureate and National and State Chancellor, **Peter Meinke**, along with other notable presenting poets, there were over fifty poets and guests attending the October convention.

In addition to programs by **Dr. Stephen Caldwell Wright** and **Webb Harris**, State Chancellor **Lola Haskins** led us through the editing thicket during a special luncheon workshop.

Three new activities or programs were introduced to the FSPA convention this year; an in-house member poetry slam, a musical ensemble, and on Sunday morning, the hosting of a "deep critique" circle for the finale.

New to the convention was our own in-house poetry slam led by former president and current national Vice President, **Joe Cavanaugh**. The Friday evening event was filled with the enthusiasm of competitors from around the state. Winners were: **Jesse Sam Owens** (LPS), **Kyra Brokoph** (TOM), and **Peter Gordon** (OAP).

Also new to FSPA was the addition of music. **Lola Haskins**, **Al Rocheleau**, and **Nancy MacInnis** talked, sang, and played guitar and harmonica in a tribute to Nobel Laureate Bob Dylan on Friday Evening. Saturday night ended the formal programs with more poems and music... and even, dancing!

In keeping with the theme, "Voices Carry", Cheri Herald led a panel discussion on strategies for publishing your book with panelists Leslie Halpern, Peter Gordon, and Gary Broughman.

Orlando Area Poets was the host chapter and many thanks go to sponsors Joseph Cavanaugh, Jesse Sam Owens, The Orlando Area Poets, Al Rocheleau, Dennis Rhodes, and Jane Peterson with ditty bags provided by Personal Mini Storage, Lake Fairview in Orlando.



This year's book is 186 pages with poems from chapter members, mem-

bers-at-large, FSPA contest winners, and FSPA student contest winners totaling 117 poems. Each year members also showcase their skill and talent behind the lens with a photo contest for the cover and other placement in the yearly poetry anthology.

This year's cover photograph titled, "Fly into a Fiery Sky" was taken by Fern Goodman from Orlando Area Poets. Eight other photographs were used throughout the book.


